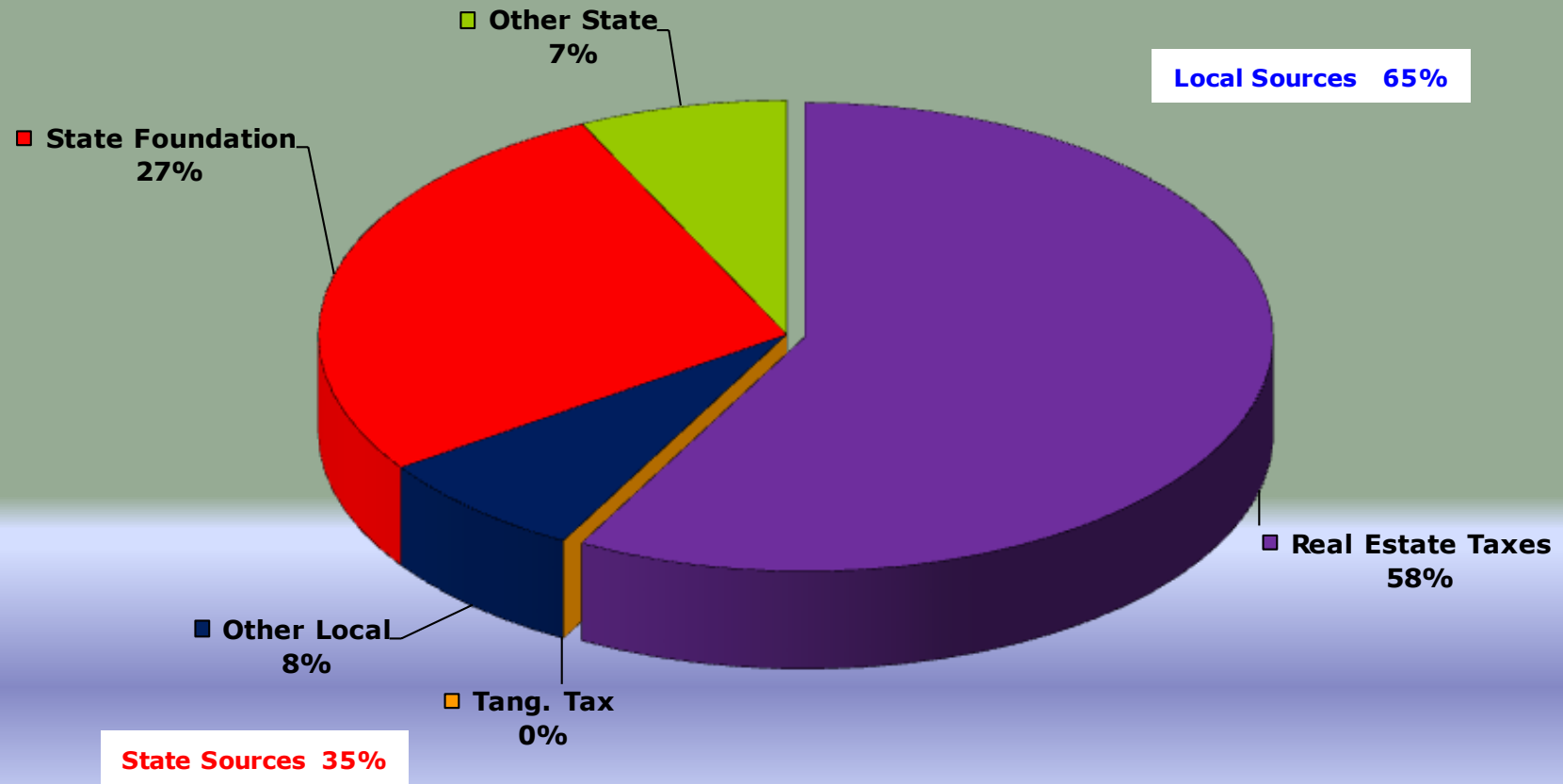

 - (\$44,000,000) valuation loss
 - \$853,000,000 assessed valuation in 2012
 - (\$500,000) approximate tax loss in FY13

Revenue Assumptions (Property Tax Allocation)



- TPP “hold harmless” Subsidy Eliminated (HB66)
 - \$1.2 MM loss in FY12
 - \$1.2 MM loss in FY13
- Electric Deregulation “offset” Payments Eliminated
 - \$465,000 loss in FY12
- Homestead/Rollback
 - \$48,000 loss in FY13-FY16

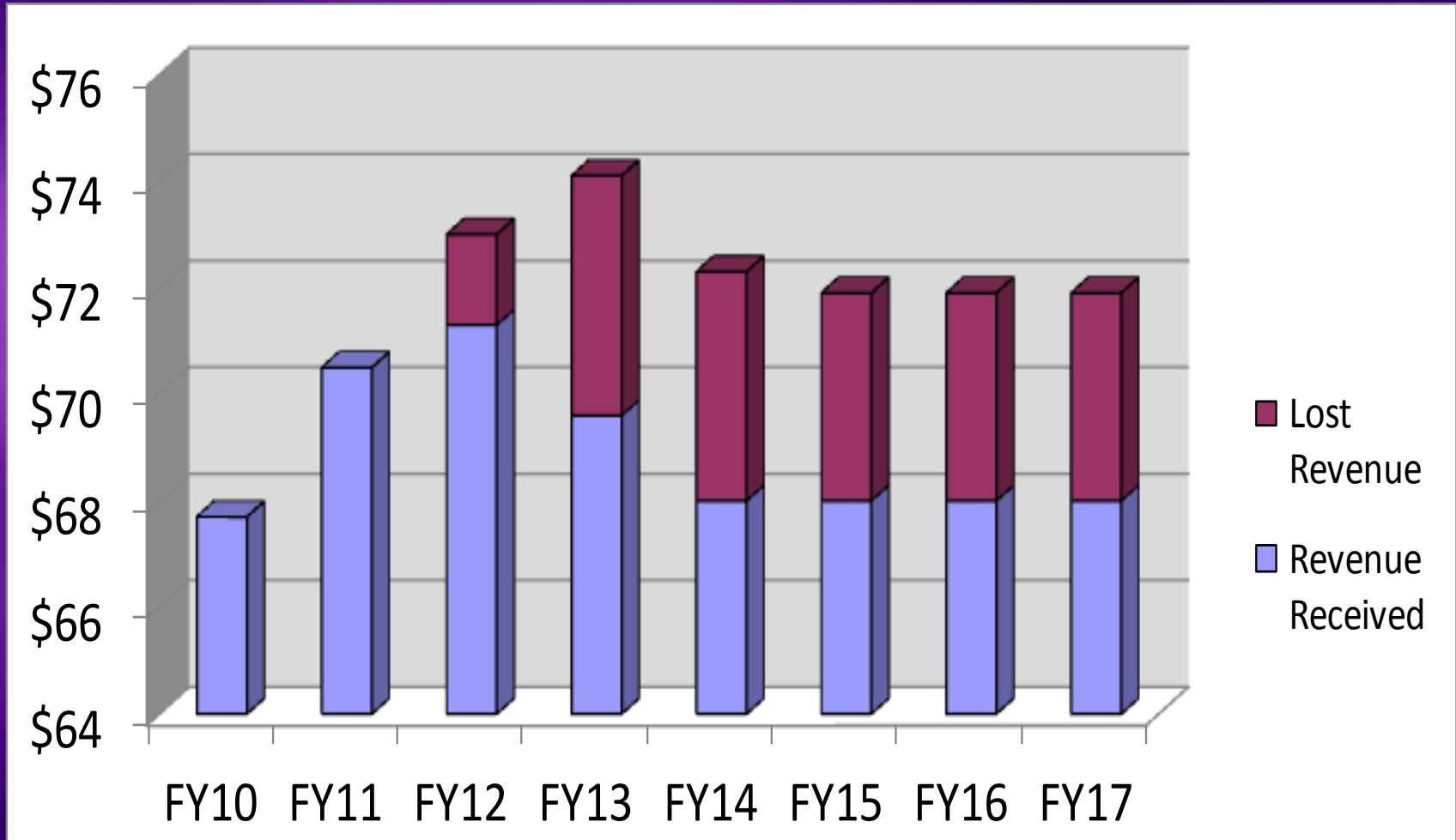

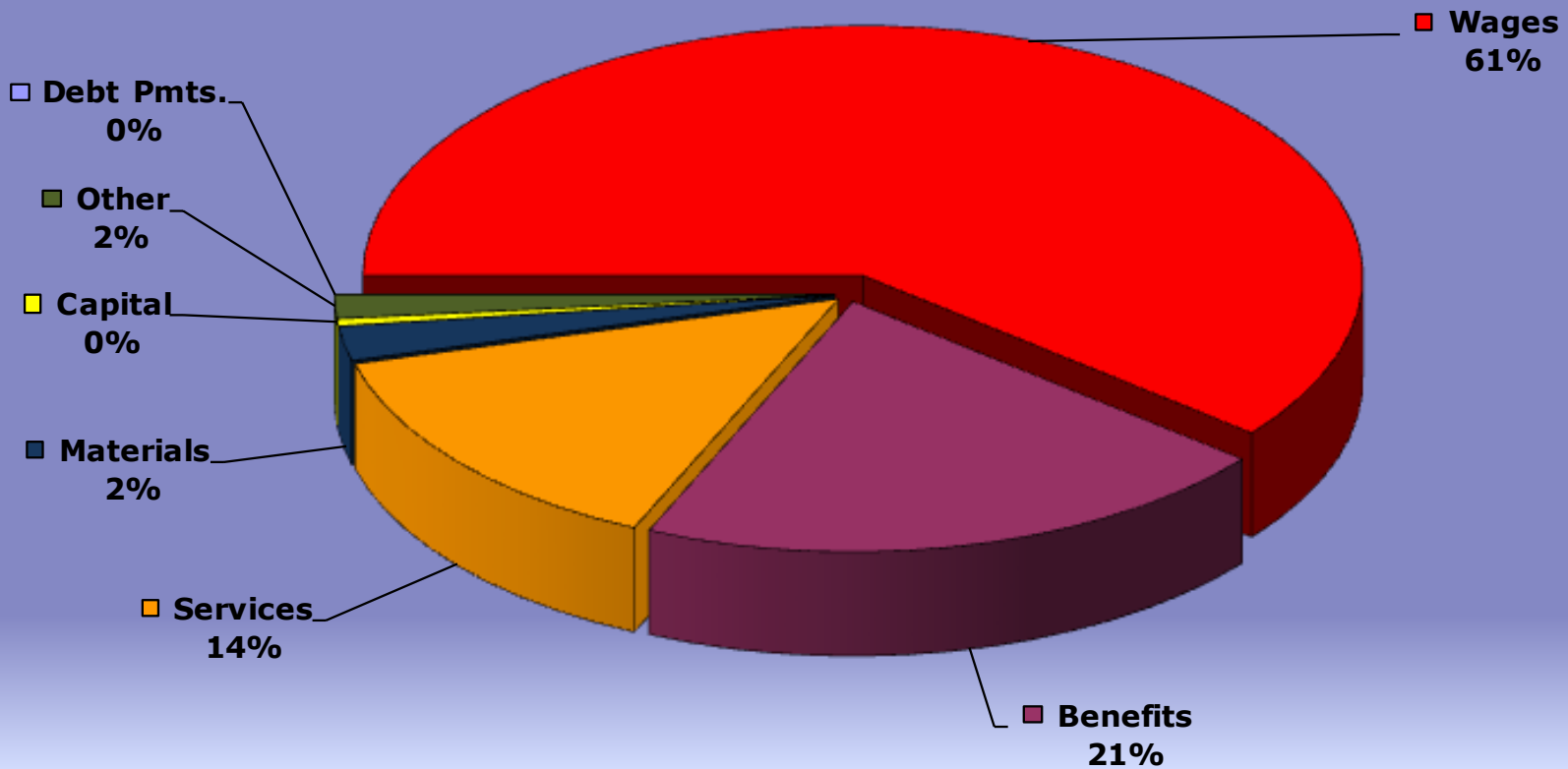
(In Millions)

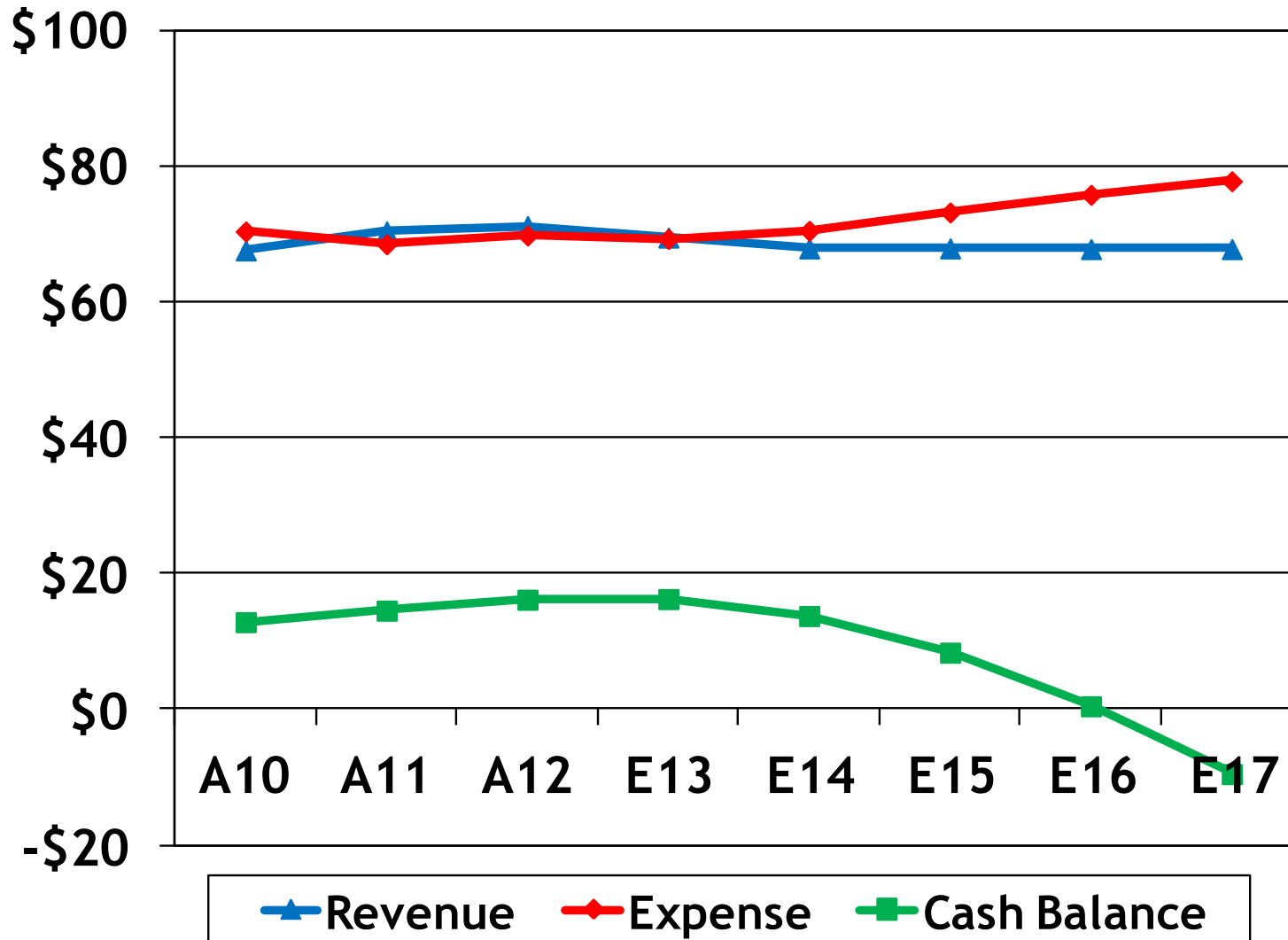

Expense Assumptions (Benefits)

 - Industry Trend: 10-16% annually in FY14-FY17

Summary – Where We Are Now



- Begin Using Cash Reserves in FY14
- Major losses in Revenue
 - Tangible Personal Property (TPP), State Foundation Funds (ARRA), Ed Jobs
 - Real Estate Taxes
- Major reductions in Expenditures
 - 84 staff positions cut
 - Wage freezes (0% on base)
 - Increased benefit contributions from staff
 - Limited capital improvement & technology expenditures

For Our Youngest Learners

 - Preschool programming serving 211 students
 - With evaluation for program participation beginning as early as 2 ½ years of age
 - All day kindergarten in all 7 of our elementary school buildings
 - Choice of full day or ½ day Kindergarten

 - At no additional charge to Lakewood Families

For Our Elementary Age Students



- The Response to Instruction and Intervention Model
 - Assesses the reading skills of all students
 - Provides reading intervention & a reading improvement and monitoring plan to those not on track to read at grade level
 - Provides research based, structured, systematic, multisensory reading intervention



For Our Elementary Age Students



- In the future we plan to:
 - Continue these intensive interventions as is required under our model and the Ohio 3rd Grade Reading Guarantee
 - Create an individual learning profile for each student in order to track and document aspirations, achievements, and areas of need



For Our Exceptional Learners



- Currently we have
 - Special Education Programming that begins evaluation of learning needs as early as 2 ½ years of age
 - Preschool Special Education Programming delivered in Lakewood Public schools, in home, or in local child care settings
 - Services in all 11 buildings including Intervention Specialists, Speech & Language, Occupational and Physical Therapists
 - Services in two participating Lakewood Non-Public Schools (Lakewood Catholic Academy & St. Edward)

For Our Exceptional Learners



- In the future we plan to
 - Continue to provide these services in all of our school buildings
 - Expand opportunities for Students with Disabilities (SWDs) to learn alongside non disabled peers
 - Increase access to technology for our SWDs

Lakewood High School/University of Akron Dual Enrollment



- Starting with 2 four-hour courses in Spanish
- Cost shared between parents and District with contributions from third party funding sources
 - Student tuition is \$100 per class
 - A parent would pay \$1,200 over two years for 36 hours of college credit or 12 three-hour courses.
 - Cost Savings of \$13,128
 - $\$398 \times 36 \text{ credit hours} = \$14,328 - \$1200$

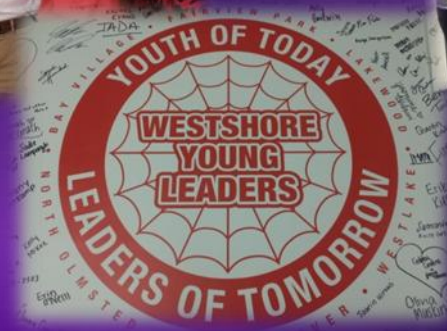
